

A group of junior high-school students from Yame City in Fukuoka Prefecture visited the Seattle-Tacoma Fukuoka Kenjinkai. This exchange was made possible by Seattle-Tacoma Fukuoka Kenjinkai Chairman, Sumio Tamai, who participated in the 8th Worldwide Fukuoka Kenjinkai Convention held last October and saw first-hand the suffering

caused by the heavy rains in northern Kyushu in July 2012. Wanting to do something to encourage those affected in Yame City, where his roots are, Mr. Tamai organised for junior high students to visit the Seattle-Tacoma Kenjinkai. During their stay, the students visited the Japanese Consulate, the Japanese Cultural & Community Center of Washington, Japanese language schools and universities, and took tours of businesses and tourist attractions.
