10th Worldwide Fukuoka Kenjinkai Convention "Roots in Fukuoka, Dreams Beyond Worlds" ~Bonding and Boundless ~ November 6th-9th, 2019 in Fukuoka Prefecture

On May 29th, 2019, the general meeting establishing of the 10th Worldwide Fukuoka Kenjinkai Convention Executive Committee was held in Fukuoka City.

The Worldwide Fukuoka Kenjinkai Convention is an event where members all of 39 Fukuoka Kenjinkai located in 24 different countries and regions of the world can gather together. After six years since it was last held in the Fukuoka Prefecture, the 10th convention will once again be held in the mother prefecture, from Wednesday, November 6th to Saturday, November 9th.

Governor Ogawa, who also serves as chairman, said, "I want to spread the word about the activities of overseas Fukuoka Kenjinkai with our residents, at the same time,

we will make every effort to plan the perfect experience for all the incoming kenjinkai members." Also, on June 18th, the opening

ceremony of "Overseas Immigration Panel Exhibition" was held in the first-floor lobby of the Fukuoka Prefectural Government Office. The date matches, Ijyu no hi, the date of early Japanese emigration. The exhibition is a related project of the world convention.

This exhibition, available for public viewing until June 28th, features the history of emigration from Fukuoka Prefecture and exchanges between the prefecture and oversea Kenjinkai. After then, the exhibition will also be held in lizuka City, Kitakyushu City, Kurume City.
