However, this year, with the decreasing number of cases of people infected with the new strain of coronavirus and the alleviation of regulations within various countries, plans for holding the following events have been made: in October, the 110th year anniversary of migration from Fukuoka to Brazil, as well as, the 90th year anniversary of Brazil Fukuoka Kenjinkai establishment, the 11th Worldwide Fukuoka Kenjinkai Convention (Peru) in November, the 70th year anniversary of the establishment of Mexico Fukuoka Kenjinkai in January 2023, and finally the 50th year anniversary of the establishment of Zai-Bolivia Fukuoka Kenjinkai in February 2023.
